Side #4: Arthur/Ned/Paige

ARTHUR. Here's the thing, Governor. And I've been teaching this lesson for 35 years. When a reporter asks you a question: giving the right answer?; that's hard. Giving the *wrong* answer?; that's *worse*. So the safest path is to not give any answer at all.

NED. You mean... don't speak?

ARTHUR. No, you speak, but you don't answer. Here, allow me to demonstrate. (He produces four white index cards.) What I have here are four index cards—numbered one through four. And on each of these cards I've written a simple phrase. (He hands NED the cards.) And what I want you to do is: take card number one, and read it out loud.

NED. Okay. (He finds the card and reads it.) "It needs fixing."

ARTHUR. Great! Now let's go back to what you were just talking about: Medicare. But this time, when Paige asks you the question, don't *answer* it, just... read that card, alright? Paige?

PAIGE. Governor Newley... what is your position on Medicare?

NED. (After a slight hesitation:) It... needs fixing.

ARTHUR. That was great, Governor.

NED. Yeah?

ARTHUR. Great start; let's try another question, okay? Using the same card. Paige?

PAIGE. "Governor. What are your thoughts on the budget deficit?"

NED. (Beat. Not meaning to hesitate, but fighting the feeling that this can't be right:) It needs... fixing.

ARTHUR. (Excited:) See? Simple! This is a simple man. And for him, every question has a simple answer. And that answer is written on

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that card. Any question you are asked can be answered with that card. Any question. Do you know what a true leader is?

NED. (With certainty:) It needs fixing.

ARTHUR. (Beat.) Oh! No-

NED. (Not wanting to disappoint, he quickly tries again:) Someone who needs fixing.

ARTHUR. No, no-

NED. Someone who needs a fix.

ARTHUR. Uh... no. Sorry, that was my fault; I meant that as a rhetorical question.

NED. Oh! (Genuinely, looking at his cards:) Which card is that?

ARTHUR. No, it's... it isn't... (Cutting his losses:) Read card number two.

NED. (He finds the card and reads:) "We have to find an outsider."

ARTHUR. Perfect. Now: let's try those two cards together. First card one, okay? Then card two.

NED. (The two cards at the ready:) Alright.

ARTHUR. Governor, what do you think about the public school system?

(Subtly holds up one finger.)

NED. It needs fixing.

ARTHUR. Fixing? How do we fix it?

(Two fingers.)

NED. We have to find an outsider.

ARTHUR. See? Amazing!

NED. (Surprised:) Oh! Okay. That's easy.

ARTHUR. Isn't it?

NED. Does it matter that I don't know what I'm saying?

DAVE. (Beat.) Oh, someone please say yes.

ARTHUR. Of course it matters.

NED. Okay; what is an outsider?

ARTHUR. An *outsider* is... someone who's not... on the inside. He's someone who... Paige, help me out here.

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
